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

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Capitalism- Present Crises and Reforms

However, the exact wealth disparity serves as an incentive for entrepreneurs to create and workers to produce in order to better their own personal standard of living. Contrary to popular belief capitalism is not a system of rugged individualism but rather one of social cooperation that expands the division of labour and offers new opportunities of employment even for those less able to compete with more productive workers. As we know An inquiry into the nature and causes of the wealth of nation is the base of capitalism.

At present the capitalism has given some bitter fruits and further challenges to the society because of improper preparation and implementation of policy generally that favors the capitalist rather than people.
